This was the decade of his lasting classics *The Valley of Silent Men* (1920) and *The Flaming Forest* (1921). He and his wife Ethel were outdoors fanatics and active conservationists.

In sweaty clubs across the nation, kids danced themselves dehydrated to the peppy rhythms and punchy horns of bands like The Mighty Mighty Bosstones and Reel Big Fish.
